Each tour, led by a volunteer guide, begins at 10:00 a.m. from various starting locations depending on the itinerary. Grant-Funded Chief Opportunity Zones Officer Joins City – The City's new Chief Opportunity Zones Officer (COZO) Monica Edwards started with the City on Monday, October 14. In September, The Rockefeller Foundation <u>announced \$3.7 million in grants</u> to Oakland and three other U.S. cities to help drive responsible private investment in Opportunity Zones. This grant will fund the COZO as well as two AmeriCorps VISTA (Volunteers In Service To America) members, who will facilitate community engagement and expand partnerships with community-based organizations. Monica's financial expertise in the real estate and business development sectors gained over more than 25 years will enable her to engage the community and facilitate a pipeline of real estate and small business projects that connect the interests of investors with those of existing community members. Most recently, she has held leadership roles at The Monarch Group, Bridge Impact Capital and ICA Fund Good Jobs. The COZO and VISTA team will be embedded in the City's Economic & Workforce Development Department. "Beyond Recognition": Lakeview Library Offers Film Screening and Discussion – On Saturday, October 26, 12pm, the Lakeview Branch Library (550 El Embarcadero) is presenting a documentary and discussion about the issue of Native Americans' ancestral burial places. Beyond Recognition relates the story of a Native woman and her allies, who occupy a sacred site to prevent its desecration. The film explores the quest to preserve one's culture and homeland in a society bent on erasing them. Through cinéma vérité, interviews, and stunning footage of the land, Beyond Recognition introduces Corrina Gould, Johnella LaRose, and Indian People Organizing for Change as they embark on an incredible journey to transform the way we see cities. The film is directed and produced by Michelle Grace Steinberg and co-produced by Robyn Bykofsky. Ms. Gould and Ms. Steinberg will be on hand for a discussion following the film. Draft Downtown Oakland Specific Plan (DOSP) and Environmental Impact Report (EIR) – Oakland's Planning & Building Department has released a Draft Specific Plan for Downtown Oakland along with a Draft Environmental Impact Report for public review. The public comment period for the Draft EIR has been extended to November 8, and the public is encouraged to submit their comments on the Draft Plan by that date as well. The community is encouraged to join public meetings to learn more about the Plan's goals to guide development and implementation for the vitality and equitable development of Downtown, ask questions of the City's planning team, and offer comments for consideration. The documents have been discussed at several public meetings, hearings and events. The final scheduled public hearing on the Draft Plan will be the Planning Commission meeting on Wednesday, November 6 (continued from Wednesday, October 2).
