MEETING AGENDA

A. Roll Call and Determination of Quorum

Present: Martin (by phone), Yi, Knox, Shim, Hummel, Johnson, Tucker, Floyd-Johnson, and Minor

Absent: None

B. Open Forum / Public Comment

Numerous public speakers expressed concern regarding the cannabis ordinances' equity permit restrictions sunsetting once the revolving loan program is implemented.

Member Hummel recommended adding the extension of the equity permit restrictions to next month's agenda. Member Tucker asked for a report on the incubator program for next month's agenda as well.

Re CRC's annual report, Member Minor mentioned that he and Member Hummel had reviewed the past three years CRC minutes and Member Minor offered to bring a chart of 2016-2018 CRC, City Council and State Cannabis actions for the CRC to review at next meeting.

D. Approval of the Draft Minutes from the Cannabis Regulatory Commission meeting of September 2018.

Persons may speak on any item appearing on the agenda; however a Speaker Card must be filled out and given to a representative of the Cannabis Regulatory Commission. Multiple agenda items cannot be listed on one speaker card. If a speaker signs up to speak on multiple items listed on the agenda, the Chairperson may rule that the speaker be given an appropriate allocation of time to address all issues at one time (cumulative) before the items are called. 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Member Floyd-Johnson moved to approve the minutes as drafted; Member Shim seconded the motion and it passed by consensus.

E. Reports for Discussion and Possible Action

1. Election of Chairperson and Vice Chairperson.

Member Hummel moved to appoint Member Yi as the new Chairperson and Member Shim as Vice Chairperson. Member Shim amended this motion to recommend Member Knox as Vice Chairperson; Member Hummel accepted this amendment and the motion passed by consensus.

2. Disposal of Cannabis Waste.

Peter Slote from Oakland Public Works, Jeff Cox from Waste Management, and Bill Pollack from Alameda County Household Hazardous Waste offered their insight on cannabis waste disposal issues. Bill Pollack mentioned that Alameda County Household Hazardous Waste has a small business component and while they cannot accept controlled substances they can accept other materials, such as batteries, pesticides, and solvents.

Member Yi expressed a desire to revisit this topic, specifically with regards to packaging, after the Bureau of Cannabis Control finalizes their regulations on waste later this year.

3. SB 1294, California Cannabis Equity Act.

Members Yi and Minor provide background on the recently passed legislation and how it is an opportunity for the City of Oakland to seek funds to further its equity programs.

Members of the public expressed equity applicants' need for funds to cover the costs of bringing spaces into compliance, state licensing, and track and trace programs. Others emphasized the need for someone to ensure the incubation program is operating as intended.

Member Shim made a motion for the City to apply for the maximum amount available under the SB 1294; Member Hummel seconded the motion and it passed by consensus.

4. Space Provided Equity Applicants Under Incubator Program

Member Hummel outlined the need for clarifying what space should qualify as legitimate space to operate an equity applicant's business in light of equity applicants being provided insufficient and inappropriate space under the auspices of the incubator program.

Members of the public also emphasized the importance of incubators providing sufficient security.

Member Hummel made a motion for staff to present the CRC with draft regulations that clarify what space and security is sufficient to satisfy the equity program. Member Knox seconded the motion and it passed by consensus.

Member Hummel mentioned that Governor Brown vetoed the state bill re compassion programs, but Gubernatorial candidate Gavin Newsom will approve such a measure if elected.

CANNABIS REGULATORY COMMISSION ITEM E-3

PROPOSED UPDATE TO CANNABIS OPERATOR REGULATIONS

Equity Permit Program

- 32. In order to receive City benefits under the Equity Assistance Program, such as fee waivers, and technical or financial assistance, Equity applicants must annually submit income and residency documents to the City Administrator, or his/her designee, that verify their equity status.
- 33. General Applicants that the City approved as incubators based on their commitment to provide security measures and three years of free real estate or rent for a minimum of 1,000 square feet for an Equity applicant to conduct its business operations must continue to provide this free space and security for the three-year period, regardless of whether the Initial Permitting Phase has expired. This three-year period commences when the equity applicant obtains access to the space for operating its business.
- 34. To preserve a General Applicant's incubator status, the Equity applicant being incubated needs to be operating an active cannabis business.
- 35. The space provided to equity applicants under the incubator program must serve the equity applicant's business operations and be sufficient for the equity applicant to successfully conduct a cannabis business. Examples of acceptable space include space for storage of cannabis products, space for manufacturing or cultivation of cannabis and cannabis products, and space for vehicles used to transport cannabis products. Examples of unacceptable space include restrooms, closet space, and parking for vehicles not required for transport of cannabis products.
- 36. Equity applicant ownership must satisfy the definition of "ownership" under OMC Section 5.80 and 5.81 such that the equity qualifying individuals maintain control over at least half of the cannabis operation.
