


Dear Neighbors and Friends,

As we were putting the finishing touches on this newsletter, Oakland experienced a day of peaceful demonstrations on May Day followed by a night of reckless and destructive rioting in a few



neighborhoods along Broadway. While the overwhelming majority of protestors remained peaceful, a small number of criminals and violent ne'er-do-wells decided to destroy local business, break windows, throw objects, and light dangerous fires on and off the street. This mentality of violently wreaking havoc serves no useful purpose. OPD arrested several of the violent rioters and is analyzing what happened in the hopes of improving its response in the future.

I have made it a top priority to increase funding for police academies to hire additional OPD police officers as well as other efforts—including beefing up our investigative capacity and expanding effective violence prevention services—to enhance safety in our neighborhoods.

Update on City of Oakland's 2015-2017 Budget Process

Mayor Libby Schaaf just released her proposed 2015-17 Budget for our city. The City of Oakland's two-year budget process will continue to be a major focus for me and all of City Hall through the end of June. As provided by the new "Budget Process, Fiscal Planning, Transparency, and Public Participation" policy that was developed in 2013-2014, budget process deadlines include:

- **April 30th** – Release of Mayor & City Administrator's Proposed Budget;
- **Between May 7 through May 30** – Community Budget Forums
 - District 1 Community Budget Forum in North Oakland, with Councilmember Kalb and Mayor Schaaf, will take place the morning of *May 30th* (See flyer below)
- **June 1** – Release of Budget Advisory Committee's Analysis/Report

As councilmembers, I and my colleagues will have challenging choices to make for the upcoming budget. We will make our final decision later in June, so if you have input for me regarding what you would like to see prioritized in the upcoming two-year budget, please e-mail my office at oluby@oaklandnet.com with "15-17 City Budget" in the Subject line.

Oakland Zero Waste (Garbage) Services

Beginning July 1st, our new Zero Waste contracts will kick-in offering new and expanded services as part of Oakland Recycles' collection of garbage, green bin organics and recycling materials for all residents in our city. There will be some level of rate increase to go along with it. The Council last year rejected a proposed deal that would have raised rates nearly 50%, opting instead for a strong package that includes enhanced services along with an approximately 24% rate increase. This brings our rates on par with many Bay Area jurisdictions.

Graffiti Abatement Murals & Green Walls: Call for Neighborhood Proposals

I am seeking neighborhood proposals to combat graffiti through the creation and installation of new murals and 'green walls' on blighted walls in District One. This work is funded through the City Council's Anti-Graffiti Murals and Green Walls grants program, which supports the beautification of Oakland and fosters community pride by transforming neighborhood streets. We encourage positive and vibrant artwork that reflects the unique character of each of our neighborhoods and the diversity of Oakland.

Children's Hospital Oakland

After years of preliminary plans, community meetings, and extensive deliberations and negotiations, the City Council will consider approving the Children's Hospital Oakland (CHO) master plan for the hospital's expansion. Over the past two years my staff and I have been meeting with neighborhood groups and nearby residents, reading comment letters, attending Planning Commission meetings and working with the Children's Hospital executive team and city staff to make sure that many of the concerns expressed by the neighbors were addressed in the plan and the potential impacts to the neighborhood are reasonably mitigated.

Concerns expressed by residents included location of the parking lot entrance, employee parking in the neighborhood, limits on future growth north of 53rd street, noise from emergency helicopters, preserving the residential feel of 53rd street, and more.

Among other things, we were successful in making sure that the residents on the streets that are eligible for hospital-paid residential parking permits went far enough into the neighborhood to protect residents from excessive employee parking, the previously proposed helicopter landing pad was withdrawn and relocated in the main campus further away from the residential streets, the entrance to the parking garage be located on MLK (not on Dover street), the residential aesthetic feel be preserved on 53rd street, and that landscaping is well taken care of and enhanced throughout the hospital campus.

City Council passes Excavation Amendment to Preserve City Sidewalks and Streets

Underground utilities such as water, electricity, natural gas, and telecommunications require occasional maintenance and reconstruction, which often result in construction activity that disrupts public streets and sidewalks. While necessary, such excavation of public rights-of-way contributes to the early deterioration of pavement. We have all seen potholes that have been exacerbated by or are the result of patched road excavations.

On March 31st, I joined with my colleagues to approve an amendment to the Oakland Municipal Code governing excavation work impacting public rights-of-way. Drafted and introduced by the Oakland Public Works department, the revised ordinance provides for best practices to balance the need for excavation work with the need for minimizing disruption to public use of sidewalks and roads. The new provisions include significantly enhanced pavement restoration requirements, improved notification to residents and businesses affected by the excavation work, new community outreach requirements for lengthy, large, or significant construction, and penalties for failure to execute excavation work according to City standards. [Information on the Minimum Wage for Small Businesses](#)



Effective March 2, 2015, the minimum wage in Oakland was raised to \$12.25 per hour. In addition, employers must provide paid sick leave to employees who work at least 2 hours per week in Oakland. Furthermore, hospitality employers who collect service charges must transmit the entirety of the charges to employees who provide the service. Lastly, employers must post notice of these rights, as well as give written notice of these rights to current employees and new employees at the time of hire.

Ride for a Reason, now in its 7th year, is a two-wheeled demonstration to advocate for more state funding for public schools, as well as a fundraiser for programs that support student creativity and a nurturing environment in six Oakland public schools. California schools have the highest student-to-teacher ratios in the nation. We can and must do better. Our goals for this event this year are 250 riders into Sacramento and \$100,000 raised for six Oakland schools: **Claremont Middle School**, Edna Brewer School, **Emerson Elementary School**, **Oakland International**, **Oakland Tech High School**, and Westlake Middle School.


