2021 Local Hazard Mitigation Plan Update

The City is in the process of updating its 2016–2021 [Local Hazard Mitigation Plan \(LHMP\)](#). The LHMP serves as a meaningful guide to increasing Oakland's resilience in the face of natural disasters, such as earthquakes, floods, extreme heat, and fires. This update is also a first step toward launching work on a Climate Vulnerability Assessment and Comprehensive Adaptation Plan – Action A–3 in the [2030 ECAP](#). Having an up-to-date LHMP ensures that the City will continue to be eligible for FEMA and related funding in the case of disasters.



Apply to PG&E Medical Baseline Program

PG&E residential customers who depend on power for certain medical and independent living needs may qualify for the [Medical Baseline Program](#). The program includes a lower rate and extra notifications in advance of a Public Safety Power Shutoff. Signature by a qualified medical practitioner is not required at this time.
