Protect Oakland Residents from Displacement & Prevent Homelessness

Issues

- Families losing home during foreclosure & predatory loan crisis
- Corporate speculation
- Corporations sitting on vacant land
- Evictions happen too often
- Black residents and culture are being pushed out
- Small businesses pushed out

"Oakland remains a Cultural Center: Families with roots in Oakland have been displaced but continue to come to Oakland to be with community – it is still their cultural center."

Solutions

- Preference policy for displaced people in new affordable housing applications
- Fund community land trusts and other co-ownership opportunities
- Protection from predatory lending
- Hire local artists for public space beautification 2



Preserve & Improve Existing Housing Stock

Issues

- Landlords do not maintain properties adequately
- Overcrowding in households
- Mold, lead, water leaks, poor ventilation
- Old buildings unkept
- Owners cannot afford upkeep
- Appliances do not work

Solutions

- Proactive inspection system
- City to provide financial support to homeowners
- Implement accessible design standards for all homes
- Tax credits/programs to help homeowners improve air ventilation
- Improved enforcement for mold clean-up

"Overcrowding [increased] during the pandemic after people lost their jobs and got displaced."

"Owners shared that they... can't afford home repairs and need support."









Expand Affordable Housing Opportunities

Issues

"Rent is too high. I pay \$3,000 per month for a small 3-bedroom house. My husband 's job reduced his hours and our CalFresh support was also reduced. All my money goes to rent"

- Build more deeply affordable • Not enough Section 8 vouchers housing • Rents continue to increase while
- wages do not
- Seniors cannot afford housing
- Owners: high property taxes and water bills
- Families cannot afford housing • Specific plans spur gentrification
- Lack of rental assistance
- Funds from impact fees do not reach community



Solutions

- Impact fees & inclusionary zoning
- First-time homebuyer support
- ADU expansion & support
- Affordable by design housing
- Fund preservation efforts &
- support limited equity housing cooperatives (LEHCs)
- Shift funds from Police Dept.

Address Homelessness & Expand Resources for the Unhoused

Issues

• City is destroying encampments

- No access to hygiene and shelter
- Property of unsheltered residents (tents, etc.) are often destroyed
- City forces unhoused to leave
- People living in cars
- No financial assistance for food, rent, etc.

Solutions

- Spread resources across the City
- Access to bathrooms and showers
- Job training
- Healthcare & supportive services
- Use public lands for temporary housing
- Pause encampment management policy for ethics review
- Restructure City's encampment management policy

"Brother is homeless, no one [I] grew up with in Oakland still lives here."









Promote Neighborhood Stability & Health

"I live near pollution, noise in Chinatown, near pollution from the Port. A lot of affordable housing is built in areas near freeways and pollution... We don't need more market rate housing, we need extremely low housing."

Issues

- Residents live in polluted areas
 Build housing in both and are at-risk of health concerns
 Build housing in both gentrifying/at-risk AND highopportunity places
- Climate change (via sea level rise
 Ensure City-owned land is used for 100% affordable housing
 Create a new neighborhood
- Oakland surpassed market rate planning council system
 production goals but not low- or or moderate-income goals
 Directly tie new City revenue to AH (e.g. transfer tax increases)
- Focusing on production in high Consider EJ & climate challenges opportunity areas alone does
 not curb displacement



Recommendations

- Structure housing action plan by the thematic areas raised through public engagement
- Discuss how HCD & Planning already respond to the issues and solutions raised through current policies & programs
- Identify gaps in City response that must be considered to address community concerns
- Ensure actions and recommendations in the HAP are legally permissible and aligned with existing City policy (per Deeply Rooted)
 for example, the PATH program should not be the focus in the
 - for example, the PATH program should no homeless support section
