MINUTES

1. Call to Order

Chair Gunst called the meeting to order at 10:08 a.m. The meeting was held via teleconference.

2. Roll Call and Determination of Quorum

5. Approval of minutes: January 4, 2023

6. Public Forum (*Limit to 2 minutes*)

Audience member Susan Hammer spoke about the California Alliance for Retired Americans (CARA) program hosting a Fabulous Friday Forum, she welcomed the commission to attend.

7. Equity in Oakland's Emergency Operations Plan Presentation, by Jessica Feil and Zack Adinoff Chair Gunst open this item by introducing Jessica Feil and Zack Adinoff. Jessica Feil shared her screen and provided a very detailed presentation about Oakland's Emergency Operations Plan. They opened the floor for questions following the presentation. Audience member Assata brought a concerning issue about schools in the Oakland hills emergency evacuation plan, says children shouldn't have to shelter in place in the Oakland Hills. Audience member Angela Wilson suggests creating a emergency evacuation plan for the developmentally disabled aging community.

*Modification: Chair Gunst opened public forum again, to accommodate those who had trouble logging on to the meeting.

Audience member Assata spoke on equity unfairness, specifically the disabled community. She stated black and brown elderly disabled people are being treated unfair within some nonprofits and government agencies.

8. Senior Companion/Foster Grandparent Program Presentation, Sabina Simmons

Chair Gunst introduced Sabina Simmons. Scott Means gave a brief introduction to what the Senior Companion and Foster Grandparent (SCP/FGP) Programs are about. Sabina Simmons gave background on what the program is and how it has changed over the years, before covid and now with new improvements the program is implementing. The program had to close in March of 2020 due to Covid, and now as of January 2023 has fully reopened.

9. Retreat Planning Update

Chair Gunst provided a brief update. There is a draft agenda, the retreat will be Wednesday, March 1, 2023. Still deciding on if the retreat will be in person or via teleconference. The purpose of the retreat is to update and advance the work of the Mayor's Commission on Aging Livable Oakland Initiative, that was initiated back in 2018. The Livable Oakland initiative focuses on four domains Housing, Health and Wellness, Communications, and Open Spaces.

10. Age-Friendly Report: Health and Wellness Stakeholders Meeting

Commissioner Spears provided an update on what the health and wellness stakeholder group is currently up to, also what was discussed during the last meeting, which was held on Thursday, January 26, 2023.

11. Older American Month Event, Scott Means

Scott Means was excited to announce we have started planning our Older American's Month Event (OAM). This event will be in person (unless something changes) on Wednesday, May 3, 2023. We will have a commission meeting that morning just to welcome the event, that will be held out in the plaza. Our first official OAM planning meeting will be February 22, 2023 @10am, we are welcoming the commissioners to join us in planning, as we have a lot of details, we could use help with.

12. Human Services Department (HSD) Aging & Adult Services Update, Scott Means, Aging & Adult Services Manager

Scott Means gave an update on the senior mental health grant, we've gotten through our approvals and will start rigorous trainings. They are hiring two case managers and an Admin Analyst I position, to support the work of the case management program. It is tax season, Scott shared a list of all the AARP

tax aide sites, this list is also available at any of the four senior centers. Scott also shared information about the City of Oakland's new housing element plan for addressing homelessness. This information is easy to find, go to google.com and type "2023-2031 Housing Element Public Hearing Draft", and it will be the first link that pops up. They are looking for public input. Lastly, Scott Means provided information on the budget. The status and how the Commission must provide an ask for our age friendly plan, this will be established at our next meeting Wednesday, March 1, 2023, which will also be our Mayor's Commission on Aging retreat.

OPED: Program is open and continues to serve the community.

MSSP: Seniors are still opting into televisits, will continue to maintain cases with porch visits until they're comfortable letting people into their homes again.

SCP/FGP: The program is staffed by 1.5 FTEs. The program will continue to sufficiently serve the community while in the recruitment process.

ASSETS: We are hiring! If you know any older adults (strong need for bilingual) who would like to participate, send them our way. The senior aide TPT positions are minimum wage \$14.36/hour at 20hrs/week. There are also employment opportunities for Physical Fitness Instructors to apply as Recreation Specialists that will service the senior centers.

SENIOR CENTERS: Senior Centers continue to provide critical services that includes food distribution, membership registration and virtual/limited-indoor programming. Have upcoming events to RSVP for any upcoming events, presentations, or classes go to MyActiveCenter.com or call (510) 238-3284 M-F 9am-3pm. We have activities at all our centers. Introducing new Senior Center newsletter. A membership into an Oakland Senior Center is not a key into the city, but a membership into a community. Working on making our Senior Centers a community benefit, improving seniors experience.
