Open Forum

Sheela Gunn-Cushman: Pointed out that parking at bus stops (Fruitvale and Brookfield) and having to exit the bus in the street is becoming increasingly common and is a major safety issue and she would like to see better enforcement. She also expressed the difficulty accessing housing resources on behalf of someone who is relocating to Oakland.

Chonita Chew: Agrees that parking in bus stops leading to drop offs in the street is an increasing danger and mentioned AB917 that will allow cameras on the front of the bus to capture and document illegal parking.

The USOAC Convention is an outdoor event this year scheduled for 7/29/22 at the Fairgrounds and the yearly Healthy Living Festival is on for 9/29 and includes free zoo admission.

The agenda was accepted without modification and unanimous voice approval.

January 2022 Minutes were approved with one edit by a motion from Commissioner Sperling, a second from Commissioner Eberhardt and unanimous approval.

The 2021 Virtual Meeting Resolution was re-adopted with a motion from Commissioner Sperling and a second from Commissioner Eberhardt with 6 votes from the six commissioners present.

Commissioner's Announcements

Commissioner Sperling has stepped down from MCPD and this meeting will be his last one.

Commissioner Tevelson (virtually) presented Commissioner Sperling with a Proclamation from the Mayor of Oakland recognizing his contribution and his MCPD leadership leading to enormous growth in the efforts of the commission to make Oakland more accessible to persons with disabilities.

General Plan Update from Lakshmi Rajagopalan and Audrey Lieberworth from Building and Planning and the General Plan Team

Action Items: ADA Staff will contact Commissioner Hattersley for the contact for the Bay Area Housing Finance Authority regional affordable housing portal project and forward.

Commissioners and ADA staff make recommendations for stakeholders to include in focus groups and ADA staff forward to General Plan team

Commissioner Sperling observed that the presentation included Race and Equity, Environmental Justice, but no a mention of persons with disabilities. Are persons with disabilities even a stakeholder? Would like to see them come back with a better presentation that was focused and relevant for MCPD.

Chair Tevelson agreed that persons with special needs was only mentioned once during the presentation and wonders if persons with disabilities are even equitable partners. He too would like to see them return with a different presentation.

Lakshmi explained that the presentation was just the very beginning of a longer engagement process and covered only on a very high level what they would be under consideration. The team has been working with ADA Program staff to identify the goals of MCPD and plans to conduct focus groups with specific populations to include persons with disabilities and will continue to work closely with ADA Programs and MCPD.

Chair Tevelson clarified that there are multiple issues to providing accessible housing to those who need it including building plans approved with appropriate accessibility specs and the final product still ending up inaccessible.

Sheela Gunn-Cushman points out that in addition to the need for very low income housing, accessing any housing waiting lists is semi-accessible at best and the majority are not accessible at all. There are multiple applications required for every single listing and no streamlined processes for people seeking housing.

Housing element will look into increasing the housing stock for low and very low income and streamlining access.

Commissioner Hattersley says that Bay Area Housing Finance Authority is currently working on a regional affordable housing portal and might be a good connection. She will provide this info to staff to share with the General Plan Team.

Commissioner Eberhardt states that persons with disabilities should always have priority access to housing.

Audrey Lieberworth says that the community engagement process on the General Plan update will continue for the next four years and that they will return to MCPD with key benchmarks and work with them in between. She requests referrals for stakeholder recommendations to invite to participate in focus groups. On March 10th, there will be a focus group on anti-displacement and tenant protections.

Sheela Gunn-Cushman recommends the CIL, Lighthouse for the Blind, and Lions Center.

Chair Tevelson requests that ADA Programs Division staff compile a list of recommended stakeholders and share with General Plan Staff and include him in the referral.

Electrifying all existing buildings in Oakland by 2040 by Shayna Hirshfield-Gold of Environmental Services Division

Action Items: ADA staff to forward links and referrals to resources described by Shayna during her presentation.

Commissioner Sperling thinks the project needs a better name.

Commissioner Eberhardt is very concerned about the costs involved and that the rebates barely touch the overall costs of eliminating gas appliances

Chair Tevelson thinks that the fact that PG&E does not make any arrangements for people with disabilities during any planned maintenance outages.

Chair Tevelson also observes that much of Oakland housing stock is not even currently wired to take on the load of electric appliances replacing gas ones.

Chonita Chew requests assistance with accessing resources to chance to solar but she lives in Berkeley and wonders if they are also available to her. Shayna verifies that rebates and incentives are alameda county wide.

Switch is On website is a new clearing house for energy incentives.

Sheela Gunn-Cushman referred Shayna to Vance Taylor, OES Access and Functional Needs and she would like to get the Switch is On link in meeting follow ups and get info about resources for renters.

March 2022 VIRTUAL MEETING RESOLUTION

ADOPT A RESOLUTION DETERMINING THAT CONDUCTING IN-PERSON MEETINGS OF THE MAYOR'S COMMISSION ON PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES (MCPD) AND ITS COMMITTEES WOULD PRESENT IMMINENT RISKS TO ATTENDEES' HEALTH, AND ELECTING TO CONTINUE CONDUCTING MEETINGS USING TELECONFERENCING IN ACCORDANCE WITH CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 54953(e), A PROVISION OF AB-361.

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom declared a state of emergency related to COVID-19, pursuant to Government Code Section 8625, and such declaration has not been lifted or rescinded. See https://www.gov.ca.gov/wp-content/uploads/2020/03/3.4.20-Coronavirus-SOE-Proclamation.pdf

WHEREAS, on March 9, 2020, the City Administrator in their capacity as the Director of the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), issued a proclamation of local emergency due to the spread of COVID-19 in Oakland, and on March 12, 2020, the City Council passed Resolution No. 88075 C.M.S. ratifying the proclamation of local emergency pursuant to Oakland Municipal Code (O.M.C.) section 8.50.050(C); and

WHEREAS, City Council Resolution No. 88075 remains in full force and effect to date; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends physical distancing of at least six (6) feet whenever possible, avoiding crowds, and avoiding spaces that do not offer fresh air from the outdoors, particularly for people who are not fully vaccinated or who are at higher risk of getting very sick from COVID-19. WHEREAS, the CDC recommends that people who live with unvaccinated people avoid activities that make physical distancing hard. *See* https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/about-covid-19/caring-for-children/families.html;

WHEREAS, the CDC recommends that older adults limit in-person interactions as much as possible, particularly when indoors. See https://www.cdc.gov/aging/covid19/covid19-older-adults.html;

- **WHEREAS**, the CDC, the California Department of Public Health, and the Alameda County Public Health Department all recommend that people experiencing COVID-19 symptoms stay home. See https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/if-you-are-sick/steps-when-sick.html;
- **WHEREAS**, persons without symptoms may be able to spread the COVID-19 virus. See https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/prevention.html;
- **WHEREAS**, fully vaccinated persons who become infected with the COVID-19 Delta variant can spread the virus to others. See https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/fully-vaccinated.html;
- **WHEREAS**, the City's public-meeting facilities are indoor facilities that do not designed to ensure circulation of fresh / outdoor air, particularly during periods of cold and/or rainy weather, and were not designed to ensure that attendees can remain six (6) feet apart; now therefore be it:
- **WHEREAS,** holding in-person meetings would encourage community members to come to City facilities to participate in local government, and some of them would be at high risk of getting very sick from COVID-19 and/or would live with someone who is at high risk; and
- **WHEREAS,** in-person meetings would tempt community members who are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms to leave their homes in order to come to City facilities and participate in local government; and
- **WHEREAS,** attendees would use ride-share services and/or public transit to travel to in-person meetings, thereby putting them in close and prolonged contact with additional people outside of their households; and
- **WHEREAS,** on October 18, 2021 the Mayor's Commission on Persons with Disabilities (MCPD) adopted a resolution determining that conducting in-person meetings would present imminent risks to attendees' health, and electing to continue conducting meetings using teleconferencing in accordance with California Government Code Section 54953(e), a provision of AB-361; now therefore be it:
- **RESOLVED:** that the MCPD finds and determines that the foregoing recitals are true and correct and hereby adopts and incorporates them into this Resolution; and be it
- **FURTHER RESOLVED:** that, based on these determinations and consistent with federal, state and local health guidance, the MCPD determines that conducting in-person meetings would pose imminent risks to the health of attendees; and be it

Exhibit B

FURTHER RESOLVED: that the MCPD firmly believes that the community's health and safety seriously and the community's right to participate in local government, are both critically important, and is committed to balancing the two by continuing to use teleconferencing to conduct public meetings, in accordance with California Government Code Section 54953(e), a provision of AB-361; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: that the MCPD will renew these (or similar) findings at least every thirty (30) days in accordance with California Government Code section 54953(e) until the state of emergency related to COVID-19 has been lifted, or the MCPD finds that in-person meetings no longer pose imminent risks to the health of attendees, whichever is occurs first.

This Handbook provides information about the history and background of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), the role of ADA Programs Division, MCPD roles and responsibilities, and the protocol and guidelines for MCPD meetings.

Roles, Responsibilities, and Protocols

Online Decorum and Protocols

It is important that each Commissioner have a clear understanding of how to conduct and participate in fair and effective public meetings.

Clear meeting procedures with strong facilitation assure that meetings remain on topic and timely, encourage multiple points of view, and ensure that clear decisions are made.

Roles, Responsibilities, and Protocols

The camera and microphone are unforgiving!

MCPD meetings are public, televised, and recorded.

Professional appearance, tone, and attitude are mandatory, despite the virtual nature of the meetings.

Commissioners must always remain aware of the camera and microphone and avoid inadvertent unprofessional actions or vocalizations.

Roles, Responsibilities, and Protocols

The camera and microphone are unforgiving!

Commissioners must be prepared for meetings;

- •Familiar with the current agenda items under consideration, and
- ·Ready to engage in discussion about them, and
- •Prepared to report on their own activities to further the strategic plan, goals, and objectives of MCPD.

ADA History & Legal Background

The ADA is a comprehensive anti-discrimination law that extends to virtually all areas of society and to every aspect of daily living.

The ADA is organized into five broad civil rights areas, called "Titles."

The City of Oakland ADA Programs Division ensures compliance with Title II of the ADA.

ADA History & Legal Background

Title II: State and Local Government Services – Requires public programs and services be made accessible to persons with disabilities. Mandates non-discrimination on the basis of disability in policy, practice and procedure. Prescribes a self-evaluation process and requires that architectural and communications barriers be removed to the extent necessary to provide full access to programs and services.

ADA History & Legal Background

ADA programs does not provide direct services or case management. ADA Programs Division staff, who are responsible to the administrative departments of the City, can play a role in supporting MCPD's initiatives by providing relevant background information to assist in the MCPD's decision-making, but may only do so in a manner that is consistent with established duties and work priorities which are dictated by Title II of the ADA.

- DDARCs are a part of a two-way communication listserv that is used for sharing information on disasters, emergencies, information and resources across all DDARCs

Disasters/Emergencies and Access

- Virtually all disaster or emergency incidents disproportionately affect individuals with access and functional needs (AFN)
- There are different types of power outages that occur across the state: Planned Outages, Unplanned Outages, Weather Related Outages
- Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS) events are power outages that are planned as a mechanism to prevent and limit wildfires from starting due to old power lines and hardware that need desperate replacement and updating
- Disability Disaster Access & Resource Centers are currently funded to assist individuals with Access and Functional Needs impacted by a Public Safety Power Shutoff

DDARC Public Safety Power Shut-Off Services

- Disaster/Emergency Training for Community Members & Individuals
- Assessment of DDARC applicants
- Emergency/disaster preparedness plans with individuals
- Medical Baseline program enrollment and other alert systems available
- PSPS resources:
 - -hotel/motel stay
 - -backup battery
 - -food assistance
 - -accessible transportation
- Follow-up before, during and after active PSPS event

DDAR Application & Assessment Process

 Applicants can either apply directly on the DDAR website or CRIL can submit on their behalf.



 Each applicant will be assessed by the DDARC staff by using the DDARC assessment tool.

DDAR Qualifications

- Applicant must use an electric powered assistive technology device or durable medical equipment as a part of their daily living needs
- Applicant must have a residence within a CPUC Wildfire Threat Tier 3 or Tier 2 area
- Applicant must be willing to enroll in the PG&E Medical Baseline program if they
 are not already in it
- Applicant must have or be willing to get assistance from DDARC staff in developing a personalized preparedness plan

DDAR Backup Batteries

- Powered assistive technology devices and Durable Medical Equipment are diverse and use a range of watts to keep them on
- A portable battery will not work for everyone and especially for individuals who use multiple AT devices or DME, personalized tests maybe needed
- DDARCs can determine if an applicant who qualifies for a battery
- Applicants who wish to purchase their own battery, but do not have the upfront funds are encouraged to apply for a CFILC Freedom Tech loan
- If an applicant qualifies for a portable battery, they must complete a liability waiver form

Additional DDAR Support

Motel/Hotel Support

-Applicants who do not qualify for a portable battery, but have a home within a PG&E area should be offered a hotel/motel stay as an alternative during an active PSPS

Food Support

-Applicants who have a home within a PG&E area and are assessed and qualify for full DDAR program should be provided food support, if needed during an active PSPS

Transportation Support

- -Applicants who qualify for DDAR and have a home within a PG&E area can be provided transportation to and from a community resource or charge station during an active PSPS event
- -Applicants can also be provided transportation to and from (one time each way) their home and motel/hotel during an active PSPS event
- -Gas to and from these locations can also be covered

Active vs Proactive Services

- Proactive DDAR & PSPS Services: DDAR applications should be sent by CFILC to DDARC staff within 1 2 days. Applicants are notified that they will be contacted by their local DDARC within 4 5 business days. All DDARC applicants should be assessed, become an ILC consumer and be provided services.
- Active PSPS Services: CFILC is notified about 72 hours before an active PSPS event, (by PG&E, we are working with the other utilities to do the same). DDARC's use the 48 hour DDARC checklist to prepare for active PSPS event. When the event begins CFILC and the local DDARC's prioritize those in immediate danger first. Typically, these are individuals coming to us directly from PG&E's OES Situation Room. CFILC and CRIL have up to two hours to respond to the situation room by email and should always cc CFILC staff so that duplicate work is not done.

- Prepare for emergencies before the emergency!
