• Chair Tevelson reports meeting with OPD and initial steps in confirming a presentation from OPD at the November meeting and directs ADA staff to continue to press for confirmation.

- Chair Tevelson reports ADA Programs has been moved out of OakDOT and is now part of the City Administrator's Office as recommended by MCPD.
- Vice Chair Eberhardt will touch base with other commissioners working on the same goals.
- Commissioner Hattersley has no updates but looks forward to advancing affordable housing opportunities.
- Commissioner O'Malley would like to support however he can but especially with goal 1.2 and to assist the community in terms of disasters and power shut offs. Also interested to update the goal stated in 2.1.
- Chair Tevelson states that ADA Programs has recommended 3 new appointees to the Mayor's office and hopes they will be appointed in time to participate in developing the 2023 strategic plan goals.
- Commissioner Moore does not believe that he has been assigned any goal and Chair Tevelson reminds him that he signed up for 2.1 and that he could go ahead and review the strategic goals and updates just sent out.

Chair Tevelson updated the commission on the position taken on hosting candidate forums during 2022 strategic planning that MCPD and ADA programs did not have capacity but urged all commissioners to reach out to all candidates running to advocate on behalf of persons with disabilities.

• Chair Tevelson would like to be provided with contacts for all candidates for Oakland Mayor and Oakland City Council seats

Zero Emission Vehicle Action Plan Update with Michael Randolph from OakDOT.

• Vice Chair Eberhardt observes that all the charging times and options mentioned seem like a very long time to make a car just go and that there would need to be a lot of charging stations to meet the need. She also does not like the use of PG&E and it seems like it would be

very difficult to manage the charging. What about the costs of retrofitting housing?

- Commissioner O'Malley what is the ideal proportion of public and private ownerships of charging facilities? Is there publicly owned real estate that is accessible and has been identified for potential use?
- East Bay Community Energy provides clean energy to Oakland and is a partner utility in the effort to build out charging in the East Bay. There are already a few chargers in the public right of way but it is expected that there will be a lot of public/private partnerships needed to meet capacity.
- Chair Tevelson will accessible spots have signs? Yes. What about BART? They have their own plan and agenda but they are also thinking it through right now but contacts have been made with them. Will there be enforcement at charge stations that are used for parking? Municipal codes will need to be updated to actually enforce charging only.
- The issue of battery fires with ZEVs is a safety concern and there is dialogue with OFD and keeping them updated on addressing the batteries and the charging stations is an action in the plan.

Kerby Olsen, presented and took questions and comments on a proposal to systematically address parking on the sidewalk on narrow streets throughout the City where this behavior occurs.

- Chair Tevelson mentions that High Street from MacArthur that is a wider street but the driveways are very steep and residents avoid them and use the sidewalk.
- Commissioner O'Malley asked about the equity issue and whether enforcement might be based on the amount of off-street parking available. Resident parking might be more accessible in more affluent neighborhoods.
- The goal is to improve sidewalk access for the benefit of everyone who uses it. The job is really just to enforce the rules about where

people should not be parking and the plan is to address the issue wherever it occurs.

- Michele Magar wonders if there is plan to prioritize streets with persons who use wheelchairs who have made complaints. The plan now is to address the narrow streets where sidewalk parking occurs. It is a good suggestion to look at where the complaints are coming in. Parking enforcement does respond to requests and parking citation data can and should be used in the ongoing analysis.
- Commissioner O'Malley would like to see the updated data sets on the complaints about sidewalk parking.
- Commissioner Moore recommends a connection with Lighthouse for the Blind which does travel training in Oakland.
- Short driveways that extend over the sidewalk are not private property so cars that are parked over the sidewalk are blocking the right of way and there is enforcement.

Chair Tevelson suggested that MCPD include community outreach at city sponsored events and using engagement opportunities with social media in the 2023 strategic planning with the goal of increasing attendance and community input. He urges all commissioners to reach out to all candidates running to advocate on behalf of persons with disabilities and to share any contacts that they have for the candidates.

- Anh Nguyen says that ADA Programs has an MCPD table banner.
- Michele Magar suggested that MCPD draft a set of questions for Mayoral candidates (and City Council?) and send them to each candidate. The MCPD can publish their responses side by side so that their positions on disability issues and the critical importance of ADA compliance in the City of Oakland is transparent and in their own words.
- Chair Tevelson has asked that each commissioner think about their questions and send them to staff attention.

There was a discussion on an MCPD Retreat for strategic planning.

- Chair Tevelson asked for a survey on who is interested and who is available for an in-person meeting on a Saturday in October or November.
- It is not certain that the City of Oakland is ready to have in person commission meetings. Anh says he will continue to reach out for clarification.

Chair Tevelson requested the meeting be extended 5 to 10 minutes although Vice Chair Eberhardt did have to leave at 7:30 pm.

- Chair Tevelson requests that Anh reach out and find out if we can have a meeting in person and what location the city can offer.
- Anh still wants to determine the interest in having an in-person retreat and will send out a survey to find level of interest.
- Chair Tevelson asks if meeting can be changed to November.

Staff Updates and Announcements

- There is an Oakland Mayor Candidates forum at Laney College on August 30th.
- ADA Programs has moved to City Administrator's Office.
- Anh needs a facilitator to help with the strategic plan and asks that if anyone has a good candidate to send him the information.

September 2022 VIRTUAL MEETING RESOLUTION

ADOPT A RESOLUTION DETERMINING THAT CONDUCTING IN-PERSON MEETINGS OF THE MAYOR'S COMMISSION ON PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES (MCPD) AND ITS COMMITTEES WOULD PRESENT IMMINENT RISKS TO ATTENDEES' HEALTH, AND ELECTING TO CONTINUE CONDUCTING MEETINGS USING TELECONFERENCING IN ACCORDANCE WITH CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 54953(e), A PROVISION OF AB-361.

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom declared a state of emergency related to COVID-19, pursuant to Government Code Section 8625, and such declaration has not been lifted or rescinded. See <u>https://www.gov.ca.gov/wp-content/uploads/2020/03/3.4.20-Coronavirus-SOE-Proclamation.pdf</u>

WHEREAS, on March 9, 2020, the City Administrator in their capacity as the Director of the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), issued a proclamation of local emergency due to the spread of COVID-19 in Oakland, and on March 12, 2020, the City Council passed Resolution No. 88075 C.M.S. ratifying the proclamation of local emergency pursuant to Oakland Municipal Code (O.M.C.) section 8.50.050(C); and

WHEREAS, City Council Resolution No. 88075 remains in full force and effect to date; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends physical distancing of at least six (6) feet whenever possible, avoiding crowds, and avoiding spaces that do not offer fresh air from the outdoors, particularly for people who are not fully vaccinated or who are at higher risk of getting very sick from COVID-19. *See <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/prevention.html</u>;*

WHEREAS, the CDC recommends that people who live with unvaccinated people avoid activities that make physical distancing hard. See https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/about-covid-19/caring-for-children/families.html;

WHEREAS, the CDC recommends that older adults limit in-person interactions as much as possible, particularly when indoors. *See* <u>https://www.cdc.gov/aging/covid19/covid19-older-adults.html;</u> September 2022 VIRTUAL MEETING RESOLUTION **WHEREAS**, the CDC, the California Department of Public Health, and the Alameda County Public Health Department all recommend that people experiencing COVID-19 symptoms stay home. See <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/if-you-are-sick/steps-when-sick.html</u>;

WHEREAS, persons without symptoms may be able to spread the COVID-19 virus. See <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/prevention.html;</u>

WHEREAS, fully vaccinated persons who become infected with the COVID-19 Delta variant can spread the virus to others. *See <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/fully-vaccinated.html</u>;*

WHEREAS, the City's public-meeting facilities are indoor facilities that do not designed to ensure circulation of fresh / outdoor air, particularly during periods of cold and/or rainy weather, and were not designed to ensure that attendees can remain six (6) feet apart; now therefore be it:

WHEREAS, holding in-person meetings would encourage community members to come to City facilities to participate in local government, and some of them would be at high risk of getting very sick from COVID-19 and/or would live with someone who is at high risk; and

WHEREAS, in-person meetings would tempt community members who are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms to leave their homes in order to come to City facilities and participate in local government; and

WHEREAS, attendees would use ride-share services and/or public transit to travel to in-person meetings, thereby putting them in close and prolonged contact with additional people outside of their households; and

WHEREAS, on October 18, 2021 the Mayor's Commission on Persons with Disabilities (MCPD) adopted a resolution determining that conducting in-person meetings would present imminent risks to attendees' health, and electing to continue conducting meetings using teleconferencing in accordance with California Government Code Section 54953(e), a provision of AB-361; now therefore be it:

RESOLVED: that the MCPD finds and determines that the foregoing recitals are true and correct and hereby adopts and incorporates them into this Resolution; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: that, based on these determinations and consistent with federal, state and local health guidance, the MCPD determines that conducting in-person meetings would pose imminent risks to the health of attendees; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: that the MCPD firmly believes that the community's health and safety seriously and the community's right to participate in local government, are both critically important, and is committed to balancing the two by continuing to use teleconferencing to conduct public meetings, in accordance with California Government Code Section 54953(e), a provision of AB-361; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: that the MCPD will renew these (or similar) findings at least every thirty (30) days in accordance with California Government Code section 54953(e) until the state of emergency related to COVID-19 has been lifted, or the MCPD finds that in-person meetings no longer pose imminent risks to the health of attendees, whichever is occurs first.

Building Trust with Community Members 8/22/22

MACRO was dispatched by 911 dispatch to an individual displaying erratic behavioral concerns in Fruitvale area. MACRO arrived on scene to find individual pacing back and forth and having self talks. MACRO attempted to engage with individual, but individual walked away in fast pace. MACRO team adjusted approach and attempted reengagement. MACRO CIS was able to successfully have a conversation with individual stating they were in this area to clear their head and wanted money to catch the bus back to East Oakland. MACRO team asked recipient if they had any medical concerns or reasons to go to the hospital. This question seemed to have possibly triggered the individual as they walked away from CIS. MACRO team reflected seeing individual in various parts of East Oakland but has never shown any violent behavior. A different MACRO team has been dispatched to the same individual in the past with no successful resolution. MACRO teams will continue to make contact with recipient so a rapport might be established. All times approx. MACRO call complete.

Facilitating Interactions Between Businesses and Unhoused Individuals 8/24/22

Upon MACRO arrival found individual sleeping on sidewalk in tent next to business buildings. Once awake, the individual appeared alert and in no distress. MACRO was made aware of this individual by a business owner in the area that had a complaint about customers not being able to use the sidewalk near the business due to the large size of the individual's tent. The individual was made aware of the situation and the report. The individual expressed that they were "moving into an apartment within a day or two". The individual assured MACRO team that they and the tent will be removed from area within an hour and a half. MACRO will return to area in 2 hours to verify the client was been compliant and left the area. There were no visible signs of injury or illness. The individual denied having any medical complaints or any desires to be transported to any hospital for any evaluation or treatment. No further assistance required.

Local Service Referrals (August 2022)

The MACRO Program referred 2percent of its total calls in August to local services to meet the specialized needs of individuals seeking care.

Utility of local service providers depends on resources, beds, and spots available. Some of the variance in referrals depend on the availability of these resources to engage in a successful referral.

Approximately one individual per day in August expressed desire and were transferred by MACRO responders to local service providers for more targeted support.

Calling Behavioral Health to De-escalate 8/23/22

MACRO 2 arrived on scene for indecent exposure. MACRO located individual who was fully clothed. MACRO determined that this individual was a prior contact and attempted to build a full picture of needs based on prior interactions with this individual. It was determined that this call required behavioral resources and MACRO attempted to bring appropriate resources to scene. MACRO contacted Oakland Fire Dispatch to bring the Community Assessment and Transport Team (CATT) on scene to help connect the individual with behavioral support resources. When CATT unit arrived on scene, the reporting party (RP) become involved and disrupted MACRO and CATT efforts. The individual became alerted to the number of individuals in the area and fled off scene. The individual made requests to remove CR. It was explained that the RP request was not immediately workable. Both MACRO and CATT provided their scope of service and solution expectations. At this time, no resolution could be produced, but MACRO made clear an effort to work with individual on a resolution.

Successful Outcomes through Dignity and Respect 8/19/22

MACRO was dispatched by Oakland Police Department for public disturbance/indecent exposures. Per fire dispatch, the scene was described as 5 individuals blocking the sidewalk and causing public disturbance and exposing themselves. MACRO team arrived on scene to find 3 individuals sitting outside of a business. MACRO team approached individuals and introduced themselves. One of the individuals recognized MACRO team and requested a hygiene kit which MACRO was not able to provide due to low stock of supplies. MACRO team let individuals know a complaint was called and were being asked to move. Individuals were receptive and understanding and appreciated the MACRO team's approach. MACRO let individuals know that if someone calls again, PD might be the one to show up which they agreed was not a good idea and decided to relocate. MACRO had a successful interaction and outcome.
