Staff Labor Hours per Park Acre for the fiscal year is updated. Ballfields Mowed data capture available through July. New metrics added to monitor Monthly Litter Collection by Hours and Volume, and the number of times Park Restroom Cleanings occur monthly updated through July. **RESOLUTION NO. 2021-04** 

RESOLUTION RENEWING AND CONTINUING THE PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION'S DETERMINATION THAT CONDUCTING IN-PERSON MEETINGS OF THE PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION AND ITS COMMITTEES WOULD PRESENT IMMINENT RISKS TO ATTENDEES' HEALTH, AND ELECTING TO CONTINUE CONDUCTING MEETINGS USING TELECONFERENCING IN ACCORDANCE WITH CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 54953(e), A PROVISION OF AB-361.

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom declared a state of emergency related to COVID-19, pursuant to Government Code Section 8625, and such declaration has not been lifted or rescinded. (*See <u>https://www.gov.ca.gov/wp-content/uploads/2020/03/3.4.20-</u> <u>Coronavirus-SOE-Proclamation.pdf.</u>); and* 

WHEREAS, on June 17, 2022 Gavin Newsom issued Executive Order N-11-22 reaffirming that a State of Emergency exists in California as a result of COVID-19. (*See* <u>https://www.gov.ca.gov/wp-content/uploads/2022/06/6.17.22-COVID-EO-Rollback-signed.pdf</u>.); and

WHEREAS, on March 9, 2020, the City Administrator in their capacity as the Director of the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), issued a proclamation of local emergency due to the spread of COVID-19 in Oakland, and on March 12, 2020, the City Council passed Resolution No. 88075 C.M.S. ratifying the proclamation of local emergency pursuant to Oakland Municipal Code (O.M.C.) section 8.50.050(C); and

WHEREAS, City Council Resolution No. 88075 remains in full force and effect to date; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) continues to recommend physical distancing of at least six (6) feet whenever possible, avoiding crowds and poorly ventilated spaces, particularly for people who are not fully vaccinated or who are at higher risk of getting very sick from COVID-19. (*See <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/prevention.html</u>.); and* 

WHEREAS, the CDC recommends that families with children under 5 and unvaccinated household members continue to take steps to prevent COVID-19 infection including distancing. (*See* <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/groups/families-covid-19.html</u>.); and

WHEREAS, the CDC continues to caution that older adults remain more likely to get very sick from COVID-19. (*See https://www.cdc.gov/aging/covid19/covid19-older-adults.html.*); and

WHEREAS, the CDC, the California Department of Public Health, and the Alameda County Public Health Department all recommend that people experiencing COVID-19 symptoms or who have tested positive for COVID-19 stay home. (*See* https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/if-you-are-sick/steps-when-sick.html.); and

WHEREAS, the CDC still finds that COVID-19 vaccines are highly effective at preventing severe illness, hospitalizations and death and continues to recommend that all eligible persons get vaccinated for COVID-19 and stay up to date on their COVID-19 vaccines. (*See* https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/prevention.html.); and

WHEREAS, vaccinated persons may still get COVID-19 and can spread the virus to others. (*See <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/effectiveness/why-measure-effectiveness/breakthrough-cases.html</u>.); and* 

WHEREAS, anyone infected with COVID-19 can spread the virus, even if they do not have symptoms. (*See <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/how-covid-spreads.html</u>.); and* 

WHEREAS, the City's public-meeting facilities are indoor facilities not designed to ensure circulation of fresh/outdoor air, particularly during periods of cold and/or rainy weather, and were not designed to ensure that attendees can remain six (6) feet apart; and

WHEREAS, holding in-person meetings would encourage community members to come to City facilities to participate in local government, and some of them would be at high risk of getting very sick from COVID-19 and/or may live with someone who is at high risk; and

WHEREAS, in-person meetings would tempt community members who are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms to leave their homes in order to come to City facilities and participate in local government; and

WHEREAS, attendees would use ride-share services and/or public transit to travel to inperson meetings, thereby putting them in close and prolonged contact with additional people outside of their households; and

WHEREAS, on October 13, 2021, the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission adopted Resolution No. 2021 - 3 determining that conducting in-person meetings would present imminent risks to attendees' health, and electing to conduct meetings using teleconferencing in accordance with California Government Code section 54953(e), a provision of AB 361; and

WHEREAS, by making these findings that conducting in-person meetings would present imminent risks to attendees' health, and by making an election to conduct meetings via teleconference, the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission may elect to continue to meet via teleconference by adopting subsequent resolutions, at least every 30 days, as part of a broader Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission agenda, and need not do so on a single-subject agenda; now therefore be it: **RESOLVED:** that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission finds and determines that the foregoing recitals are true and correct and hereby adopts and incorporates them into this Resolution; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** that, based on these determinations and consistent with federal, state and local health guidance, the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission renews its determination that conducting in-person meetings would pose imminent risks to the health of attendees; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission firmly believes that the community's health and safety and the community's right to participate in local government, are both critically important, and the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission is committed to balancing the two by continuing to use teleconferencing to conduct public meetings, in accordance with California Government Code section 54953(e), a provision of AB 361; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission will renew these (or similar) findings at least every thirty (30) days in accordance with California Government Code section 54953(e) until the state of emergency related to COVID-19 has been lifted, or the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission finds that in-person meetings no longer pose imminent risks to the health of attendees, whichever is occurs first.

### **SUMMARY**

Oakland Parks, Recreation & Youth Development received a request from Ryan Dawkins of Mascot Sports requesting approval to serve and sell alcoholic beverages (Beer & Wine), food (Mobile Food Vendors) and merchandise on-site at the annual Oakland Turkey Trot to be held at East Shore Park on Thursday, November 24, 2022. Ryan Dawkins is aware of the additional permits required. Approval from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission is required per O.M.C. Section 12.64.080.

### FISCAL IMPACT

Mascot Sports is paying all rental fees associated with the event. There is no fiscal impact on OPRYD.

### **PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION**

### **SUMMARY**

This report provides:

1. OPW's routine updates to PRAC regarding updated performance measures in the delivery of Measure Q-funded services.

### FISCAL IMPACT

Since this report is informational only, no fiscal impacts are included.

### BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Measure Q, approved by Oakland voters in March 2020, provides funding for City of Oakland services related to parks maintenance, homelessness services, and water quality, subject to civilian oversight. The Oakland City Council assigned PRAC the oversight role regarding the Measure Q expenditures related to parks maintenance and water quality services.

As a component of this oversight function, OPW routinely submits to PRAC updates on hiring of positions related to Measure Q-funded park maintenance services.

In recent dialogue with the Measure Q working group that includes PRAC Chair Allen, PRAC Vice Chair Tran, PRAC Commissioner Duhe, Measure Q community leaders, and staff from OPRYD and OPW, it was agreed that reporting on hiring Measure Q positions is not necessary monthly and can be provided quarterly. OPW providing hiring updates to PRAC in September 2022 and will implement that quarterly practice going forward.

Measure Q includes service performance requirements. OPW has been working with the PRAC Measure Q ad hoc committee and with community members to develop a reporting template for measuring and tracking performance of those services. The department's goal is a routine report that is clear, simple, and accessible to the community to provide transparent and accessible reporting on service delivery. This will be an iterative process, and OPW welcomes feedback from PRAC on how the department can continue honing that reporting template.

**<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>** OPW recommends that PRAC accept this informational report.







### **SUMMARY**

Staff from Oakland Public Works (OPW) and Oakland Parks, Recreation and Youth Development (OPRYD) request endorsement of the Estuary Park Master Plan and recommendation for approval of the proposed Minor Conditional Use Permit for the Estuary Park Phase 1 project. The Master Plan is the culmination of an intensive community engagement process and provides comprehensive recommendations to improve and expand the existing 7-acre Estuary Park and Jack London Aquatic Center site to 11 acres.

### FISCAL IMPACT

The master plan for Estuary Park will be implemented in phases as funding becomes available. Funding for the design of the Estuary Park project was approved on December 13, 2016, by Resolution No. 86516 C.M.S., which authorized the sale of the Measure DD, Series C, Bond, in the amount of \$2.7million. Additional funding for construction will be provided through the 'Measure DD' Series D Bond. City staff is working with the Measure DD Program Manager to identify the total amount of funding to be made available for Phase 1 construction and the timing for the 'Series D' Bond sale, which would make those funds available. Staff is also actively seeking additional funding for construction through grants and donations.

The final scope and cost of Phase 1 will be determined based on projected available funding at the time of construction Bid invitation, currently anticipated for Fall 2024. The cost of implementation for the complete Master Plan scope is approximately \$17million (not factoring inflation for future phase implementation).

The new restroom and locker room building will require on-going maintenance, annual inspection and repairs as necessary. Building maintenance, park lighting, graffiti abatement and playground repairs are funded by the internal Facilities Fund (Fund 4400). Measure Q provides an important source of funding for on-going park maintenance.

### **PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION**

Estuary Park is a seven-acre park located along the Oakland Estuary south of Jack London Square at the mouth of the Lake Merritt Channel. The existing park incorporates the Jack London Aquatic Center, youth and adult rowing programs, a multi-use field for soccer and team sports, a public boat

PRAC – October 12, 2022 Item #6A launching ramp, fishing pier, and a group picnic area. The old 'Cash and Carry' property will become part of the park, expanding the total park area by 4 acres to 11 acres. (see Exhibit A – *Project Location Map*).

The Master Plan for the eleven-acre park site provides a vision to create a major open space of citywide and regional significance, expand recreational amenities for a diverse community, improve access to and enjoyment of the shoreline, and improve the San Francisco Bay Trail through the park. (see Exhibit B – Illustrative Plan)

Informed by the strong community engagement process and the rich history of this site, the Master Plan vision includes the following park improvements: two gathering plazas, multi-purpose lawns, dog park, three picnic areas, nature play elements, walking paths, seating areas, resilient shoreline improvements, park elevation and planning for Sea Level Rise, improved Bay Trail connectivity, habitat gardens, refurbished trellis area and east promenade, expanded parking lot, improved boat launch access, and a boat storage building with public restrooms.

The Master Plan document, including participatory acknowledgements, site history, detailed summary of public engagement, project goals and supplementary design graphics can be found in Exhibit C – Master Plan Document.

Though the final scope and cost of Phase 1 will be determined based on projected available funding at the time of construction Bid invitation, the attached Exhibit D – Phase 1 Schematic Design, indicates the targeted scope, which includes all of the major improvements and recreational elements described in the Master Plan. The project will seek a minor Conditional Use Permit for the Phase 1 project.

### **BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY**

Through a variety of planning processes beginning in the mid 1990's, the Estuary Park Renovation and Expansion Project was proposed and thereby incorporated into several local and regional plans, including the adopted General Plan Open Space, Conservation and Recreation (OSCAR) in 1996 and the Estuary Policy Plan in 1999. As stated in the Estuary Policy Plan: "Estuary Park is a significant public asset which can and should be upgraded. It has a historic relationship with nearby Lake Merritt and the Lake Merritt Channel." "If Estuary Park is to fulfill its potential, it is important to make it more visible from the Embarcadero. It should be expanded and extended to the street, adding to the total amount of useable public space and improving park security. The entire park (including the expansion area) should be improved. Consideration should be given to providing places to observe major civic celebrations and water related festivals."

As a result of this initial planning vision, the "Cash and Carry" site located at 105 Embarcadero West will be acquired by the City through the Brooklyn Basin Development Agreement, providing visual continuity from the Embarcadero to the water and expanding the total site area from seven to eleven acres. The site is to be transferred to the City upon completion and acceptance of site remediation by the developer.

The Estuary Park Project was listed in the Measure DD – Oakland Trust for Clean Water and Safe Parks Bond program (Measure DD) under the category for Estuary Waterfront Access, Parks and

Cleanup Program, positioning the City to realize long-held community objectives for the creation of a major open space of citywide and regional significance, as described in the Estuary Policy Plan. Funding for the design of the Estuary Park project was approved on December 13, 2016 by Resolution No. 86516 C.M.S., which authorized the sale of the Measure DD Series C Bond. This positioned the City to realize long-held community objectives for the creation of a major open space of citywide and regional significance as described in the Estuary Policy Plan.

In February 2018, a professional landscape architectural services agreement for the Estuary Park project was awarded to Hargreaves Associates. A robust public engagement process was implemented between August 2018 and February 2019. For non-performance reasons, the professional services contract with Hargreaves Associates was terminated in October 2019. On July 28, 2020 a design consultant contract was awarded to WRT per Resolution 88239 C.M.S. Project reinitiation began March 2021 with new WRT Design Team.

From August 2018 through September 2021, a robust and thorough community engagement process was conducted for the Estuary Park Renovation and Expansion Project. During this period, four stakeholder and four public community meetings were held. In addition to these meetings, the team has attended over fifteen events and regularly occurring meetings. An online project website hosts project information and updates. Two online surveys were conducted, one in 2018 and the second concluding November 2021. In the second survey conducted both online and at an in-person community workshop, participants were asked to prioritize proposed elements of the Preliminary Park Master Plan, which included Resilient Shoreline Improvements along with fifteen other potential program Shoreline improvements ranked second after the Bay Trail, which runs along the shoreline and is an integral aspect of its design.

The project team has worked closely with Oakland Park, Recreation and Youth Development (OPRYD), the project's Client Department, to refine the Master Plan and ensure that park goals and program are in support of their mission to expand recreational opportunities for underserved communities of Oakland. OPRYD has provided key demographic data on existing program and rental users to support the project Racial Equity Impact Analysis and contributed their experience and expertise to identify opportunities for closing racial disparities and goals for improving outcomes for the Oakland community through the park renovation. The racial equity impact analysis and goals have informed the development of the draft Estuary Park Master Plan project goals and park program.

As part of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) review, the Estuary Park Master Plan will prepare an Addendum to the existing 2009 Oak to Ninth Project Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the proposed Estuary Park improvements. This work is currently underway, and the environmental consultants are targeting a draft for City Planning review Fall/Winter 2022.

### **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission to endorse the Estuary Park Master Plan and recommend approval of the proposed Minor Conditional Use Permit for the Estuary Park Phase 1 Project.




Exhibit B - Illustrative Plan: PRAC Item 6A 10/12/22

## **PROJECT INTRODUCTION**

#### **PROJECT DESCRIPTION**

Estuary Park is a seven-acre park located along the Oakland Estuary south of Jack London Square at the mouth of the Lake Merritt Channel. The existing park incorporates the Jack London Aquatic Center, youth and adult rowing programs, a multi-use field for soccer and team sports, a public boat launching ramp, fishing pier, and a group picnic area. A property to the northwest of the existing park will become part of the park, expanding the total area by four acres to eleven acres. The Master Plan for the eleven-acre park site provides a vision to create a major open space of citywide and regional significance, expand recreational amenities for a diverse community, improve access to and enjoyment of the shoreline, and improve the San Francisco Bay Trail through the park. The plan will be implemented in phases as funding becomes available. Phase 1 implementation will be funded through the 'Measure DD' Oakland Trust for Clean Water and Safe Parks Bond program.

### **PROJECT BACKGROUND**

Through a variety of planning processes beginning in the mid 1990's, the Estuary Park Renovation and Expansion Project was proposed and thereby incorporated into several local and regional plans, including the adopted General Plan Open Space, Conservation and Recreation (OSCAR) in 1996 and the Estuary Policy Plan in 1999. As stated in the Estuary Policy Plan: "Estuary Park is a significant public asset which can and should be upgraded. It has a historic relationship with nearby Lake Merritt and the Lake Merritt Channel." "If Estuary Park is to fulfill its potential, it is important to make it more visible from the Embarcadero. It should be expanded and extended to the street, adding to the total amount of usable public space and improving park security. The entire park (including the expansion area) should be improved. Consideration should be given to providing places to observe major civic celebrations and water related festivals."

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Funding for the Estuary Park Project was approved in December 2016 through the Measure DD – Oakland Trust for Clean Water and Safe Parks Bond program under the category for Estuary Waterfront Access, Parks and Cleanup Program. This positioned the City to realize long-held community objectives for the creation of a major open space of citywide and regional significance as described in the Estuary Policy Plan.



## **PROJECT INTRODUCTION**

#### CITY OF OAKLAND VISION AND GOALS FOR RACIAL EQUITY

In 2017 the City of Oakland established a new Department of Race and Equity (DRE), launching an effort to explicitly embed racial equity in its decisions and policies. In Oakland, equity is defined as fairness. It means that identity—such as race, ethnicity, gender, age, disability, sexual orientation or expression— has no detrimental effect on the distribution of resources, opportunities and outcomes for our City's residents. One key assumption in our work is that race matters, and this assumption is supported by the data: almost every indicator of well-being shows troubling disparities by race. By applying an equity focus and analysis to key deliberations, the City government can work with the community to create conditions where everyone has access to the opportunities necessary to meet their essential needs, advance their well-being and achieve their full potential. The City of Oakland's commitment to end systemic racism and take intentional steps to further racial equity is essential to correcting long-standing disparities and building meaningful relationships with underserved communities. Since the formation of the DRE, the City's Departments have endeavored to actualize the City's equity vision through project and program implementation. The Estuary Park Master Plan is one of these efforts.

The Estuary Park Master Plan was led by Oakland Public Works and informed by close collaboration with the Oakland Parks and Recreation and Youth Development Department (OPRYD) – as well as many other City Department and community stakeholders. The City's service-oriented Departments, such as OPRYD have a long history of serving as a liaison and steward for the communities and neighborhoods they serve. OPRYD's mission is to provide best in class, relevant and equitable programs and services, while meeting the specific needs of people and communities both at the neighborhood level and regionally throughout the City of Oakland. They achieve this mission through intentional engagement, by removing the barriers that prohibit equitable opportunities for all, and through partnerships with other mission-driven organizations. OPRYD and its partners work to remove the barriers of systemic racism by offering programs to all, regardless of

race, income or culture; and provide diversity education to foster change. Scholarships and subsidies sponsored by partner organizations are employed to provide access to all -ensuring that no child is turned away. As the Client Department for the Estuary Park Renovation and Expansion project, OPRYD established the initial goals for the project, based on their knowledge and understanding of community needs, and provided critical support in identifying and reaching the community through the engagement process. OPRYD is committed to on-going evaluation and accountability to measure the success of their recreation programs to achieving the City's equity goals.

The Estuary Park Master Plan recommendations combine our understanding of current community priorities, OPRYD's program goals, and the City's Racial Equity-driven targets for closing known disparities. The project has utilized important new Equity Tools, including the '2018 Oakland Equity Indicators Report'<sup>1</sup> and the Oakland Geographic Equity Toolbox2 to understand existing disparities and identify means of closing them through design and programming of the park. The renovated and expanded Estuary Park has the promise to positively impact two key sectors of the City's Racial Equity Indicators through physical design and programmatic activation – Fostering Civic Life and Improving Public Health. In addition, in keeping with its prominence as a regional shoreline park under State Lands jurisdiction, the plan aspires to Celebrate Site History, Increase Environmental Awareness, and Enhance Resiliency and Adaptation. These high-level goals and related objectives are outlined in the 'Project Goals' section of the Master Plan document.



## COMMUNITY MEETING #4 | OCTOBER 23, 2021

- **28 people** attended the in-person engagement event in October, and 103 people responded to the online survey.

  - Public art spaces (3)





## PARK PROGRAM

#### Entry Plaza (1)

The entry plaza will serve as the main gateway to the park, with park identification signage as space for people to gather and meet. Food trucks could use this plaza space on a regular basis to serve park users.

#### Picnic Areas (2, 11)

Picnic areas will be distributed throughout the park, with a large picnic plaza located near the parking lot, to serve large parties and provide access to vehicles. Other picnic areas will be located at the southwestern shoreline node and at the existing trellis structure. Amenities will include grills, trash and recycling receptacles, drinking fountains/potable water supply, accessible tables, and seating.

#### Multi-purpose Lawn (3)

The multi-purpose lawn will be natural turfgrass. It is sized to accommodate informal team sports such as soccer (with an area large enough for a U-10-sized field) and ultimate frisbee. The lawn can also accommodate occasional events, off-leash dogs, and picnicking.

#### Dog Park (4)

The fenced dog park is sized to accommodate both large and small dogs. The surface will be wood-chip mulch. Amenities will include benches, shade trees, and dog-waste-bag dispensers.

#### Restroom and Shower Building / Boat Storage Yard (5)

In addition to the existing public restrooms currently on the site, four additional public toilets will be provided, in a building shared with showers, changing rooms and toilets for use by the boating programs associated with the Jack London Aquatic Center (JLAC). A fenced and secured boat-storage yard serving the JLAC rowing programs and OPRYD boating programs will be located to the north of the restroom and shower building.

#### Festival / Gathering Plaza (6)

To the south of the proposed restroom and shower building and existing JLAC building, a large plaza will serve daily park uses such as tai chi, roller-skating and skateboarding, and

will function as an event plaza during festivals and other events. Food trucks will be able to access this plaza during events.

#### Playground and Natural Play Areas (7, 18)

A playground will be located to the west of the existing pergola structure. In addition to this, natural play features such as driftwood logs and boulders will be dispersed along the southern shoreline. All of the play equipment and natural play features will be constructed primarily of natural materials. The playground area will use sand as the surfacing. Maritime-themed elements will be incorporated into the play-area design.

#### **Renovated Existing Pergola (8)**

The existing Halprin-designed pergola will be maintained and renovated to address deterioration of the wooden members of the structure. The area below the pergola will remain as a picnic and seating area, with upgraded furnishings.

#### Waterfront Promenade (9)

The area between the pergola and the existing stepped bulkhead will be regraded to raise the elevation of the Bay Trail, creating a sloped area that will include planting and seating areas for passive recreation and viewing the Lake Merritt Channel.

#### Shoreline Improvements (10, 13, 14)

The southern shore will be reconstructed as a gravel pocket beach, providing a resilient shoreline with increased habitat and recreational value. This beach will be contained on the east and west by rip-rap shore-retention structures. Remaining existing grouted and non-engineered rip-rap and rubble around the shoreline will be replaced with engineered rock revetments. To the east of the JLAC parking area, just south of the existing boat ramp, a small, gravel pocket-beach will provide a soft launch for small craft.

#### Water-wise/Habitat Garden (12)

Along the western side of the park, a linear planting area of native and drought-adapted plants will form a buffer between the active portions of the park and the Portobello Apartments. This will provide habitat for pollinators, insects, birds and other animals.





## PARK PROGRAM (CONTINUED)

#### **Upgrades to the Existing Pier (15)**

The guardrail around the existing pier at the southeast corner of the site will be upgraded to meet building-code requirements.

#### Parking (16, 17)

A new parking lot will be constructed to replace the approximate number of existing parking spaces that will be removed for the park construction. In addition to automobile parking, spaces will be provided for recreational boat trailers and trailers for rowing shells.

#### **Bay Trail**

The Bay Trail will be constructed in accordance with Bay Trail guidelines, providing a 20-foot-wide multi-use trail. The Bay Trail will be elevated to the 6-foot City of Oakland elevation to mitigate for estimated sea-level rise to the year 2070, except where the trail needs to conform with existing elevations at the JLAC building and western park boundary.

#### **Sea-Level-Rise Mitigation**

Most of the program areas of the park will be elevated to prevent estimated flooding for a "low risk-aversion" project to approximately the year 2070, which is estimated to be at the 6-foot City of Oakland (COO) elevation (11.7 feet NAVD), accounting for a 1-year still water level, 1-foot allowance for wave runup, 1 foot of freeboard, and 2 feet of sea-level rise. Portions of the park will be below the 6-foot COO elevation because of the need to conform with existing conditions around and within the site, such as adjacent roadways, the Bay Trail, the JLAC building and the existing EBMUD pump station.

A longer-term adaptation strategy for a 100-year planning horizon would propose elevating critical elements of the park to the 2.7-foot COO elevation (13.2 feet NAVD). This long-term adaptation strategy will require replacing the JLAC building and raising the adjacent outdoor facilities, including the Bay Trail to the east of the JLAC building. Further study of these long-term strategies is not in the scope of this Master Plan.

#### **Emergency Vehicle Access**

Emergency vehicle access is provided as a continuous loop around the park, providing access to the Portobello Apartments on the western side of the site, the JLAC building, and the perimeter of the park. Removable bollards will prevent private vehicles from entering the park beyond the parking lot.

#### **Bicycle Access and Parking**

Bicycle access will be provided from Embarcadero and via the Bay Trail. Bicycle racks will be distributed throughout the park to accommodate cyclists using different areas and park program elements.

#### **Site Lighting and Security**

Site lighting will be provided throughout the park, including overhead lights at the parking lot, along the pathways, at the gathering areas, and at the restroom/shower building and boat-storage yard. Open sight lines will be maintained by avoiding abrupt grade-changes where possible and the selection and placement of plant material. Along the eastern edge of the pergola area, the existing low wall will be removed and the Bay Trail will be elevated, allowing open views across the eastern edge of the park. The emergency-vehicle route around the park will provide police access as well as emergency-vehicle access.

#### **Existing Facilities to Remain**

In addition to the renovated existing pergola and upgrades to the existing pier guardrail, existing water-access points will be maintained in their current locations. These include the boat ramp at the northeastern corner of the site and the floating docks along the eastern shoreline. The stepped bulkhead that is part of the original Halprin design will also remain and be repaired as necessary. The JLAC building will remain along with the adjacent outdoor areas used for boating activities, until a long-term sea-level rise adaptation is required (not in the scope of this Master Plan).

#### **SUMMARY**

Joaquin Miller Park is extremely popular for both hikers and mountain bikers. With the large volume of mountain bikers and hikers using the park, especially through the meadow and up Sunset trail as well as the Sequoia Bayview Trailhead, hikers can be very easily put at risk. <u>In situations with short sight lines and blind corners a biker may not see another trail user until they are close, leaving little time to call out</u>, leading to conflict between hikers and mountain bikers. One of the best ways to prevent this conflict is for mountain bikers to ride with bells, The bells provide communication to other trail users that another trail user is approaching much earlier than detection by line of sight. This should significantly reduce the risk of collisions. This is particularly effective in early communication of the presence of a bike but can also be effective in communicating a hiker's presence around a blind turn. Bike bell stations will provide a means to educate bikers that aren't familiar with bike bells and provide immediate access to use a bell. The bike bell stations will also inform cyclists of good trail etiquette.

We are requesting approval to build and install 2 wooden kiosks: 1 at the entrance to Sunset trail in Joaquin Miller Park and the other at the Sequoia Bayview Trailhead on Skyline Blvd. The kiosks will contain a sign encouraging bell usage as well as magnetic strips holding bike bells that people can borrow. Bike bell stations and programs like this are being used successfully in other parks including Briones and Crockett Hills in EBRPD, Napa Skyline, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, and Folsom.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

No fiscal impact. The kiosks will cost about \$600 and funding would be provided by the FOJMP and the BTCEB.

#### PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The purpose of the bike bell stations is to inform Joaquin Miller Park trail users of the importance of riding with a bell as well as to provide trail users with the resource of a bell during their time in the park. This will be beneficial to all park visitors including hikers, cyclists, and horses.

Two stations would be built: one on Sunset trail, next to the meadow, and the other at the Sequoia-Bayview trailhead on Skyline Blvd. We are looking to install the stations at the end of September 2022.

Other bike bell programs have shown that over time bells don't get returned. BTCEB and FOJMP volunteers will be responsible for restocking the bells. Fundraising by those groups will be used to buy the bells.

#### BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

This project proposal has come about through discussions of members of FOJMP and BTCEB aware of concerns with trail conflict and seeking to improve the situation. Bike bells have been demonstrated to help in trail situations as we have at Joaquin Miller Park. We believe bike bell stations will be successful in improving trail user experiences at Joaquin Miller Park by providing better notification when a bike is approaching other trail users and reducing the element of surprise that contributes to a perception of risk.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

Friends of Joaquin Miller Park, the Bicycle Trails Council of the East Bay, and Schuyler Sawicki recommend the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission recommend approval of two bike bell stations in Joaquin Miller Park.
