7. NEW BUSINESS:

A. REQUEST RECOMMENDATION TO DEDICATE A COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUE IN MEMORY OF AMEENAH NAFEESAH ROSHIMA SCOTT.

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission reviewed the staff report prepared by Gail McMillon from Oakland Parks and Recreation & Youth Development. Mercedes S. Rodriguez requested permission to dedicate a bench in memory of her daughter, Ameenah Nafeesah Roshima Scott, who was a graduate and honor student of Lowell Jr. High School and participant in the University of Berkeley college preparatory classes. On December 23, 1981, Ameenah was found dead on the ground of Lowell Jr. High School. The cause of her death was determined to be murder, and case remains unsolved to date. Ameenah was 16 years of age.

The plaque would be placed on an existing bench facing Lake Merritt in Lake Merritt/Lakeside Park on the 1300 block of Lakeshore Avenue. The dedication would read as follows:

In Loving Memory of
Ameenah Nafeesah Roshima Scott
February 21, 1965 – December 23, 1981
Beloved daughter, sister, friend and honor student

C. REQUEST FOR THE PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION TO REVIEW AND PROVIDE COMMENT ON THE TWO (2) GIFT IN PLACE DESIGN OPTIONS BY OAKLAND ARTIST MUZAE SESAY FOR THE RAINBOW RECREATION CENTER PUBLIC ART PROJECT IN EAST OAKLAND, WITH FINAL DESIGN TO BE SELECTED BY TEENS OF THE DIGITAL ARTS AND CULINARY ACADEMY (DACA).

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission reviewed the staff report prepared by Denise Louie, Oakland Public Works, CIP Coordinator - Project Delivery.

Public Works made a presentation and requested comments on two) gift in place design options by Oakland artist Muzae Sesay for the Rainbow Recreation Center Public Art Project in East Oakland. The final design selection will be made by teens participants of DACA.

This project was presented to the Public Arts Advisory Committee - PAAC on October 1, 2018. Out of sequence with the usual initial review, comments, and recommendations provided from PRAC to staff and PAAC, PRAC's comments were made post approval of the project. Project Delivery cited timing and coordination of the larger capital renovation project and contracting for the gift in place for the basketball courts renovation at Rainbow Recreation as the cause for the reversed presentation and approval process.

The Commission reviewed both options 1 and 2, and collectively concluded that in Design #1, the 3-point line should have been more defined and that the overall game lines would be obscured by the design of the artwork. PRAC members suggested renderings of the artwork with the game lines overlaid would have been helpful in evaluating suitability of the two options for installation.

Once applied to the surface, the artwork is expected to last 5 to 8 years. Extra paint used in the initial design will be provided by the artist for touch up maintenance. A set aside fund will be established to resurface the courts with a uniform color should it become necessary in the future.

Teen patrons of DACA participated in the project and design concept and will make the final decision for which of the two options will be included in the exterior basketball court resurfacing.

The Commission that the greater community was not noticed of or included in the project discussion. Staff explained that the artist wanted DACA's teens to have the experience of engaging in the full art installation process.

The Commission acknowledged appreciation for the project, but reminded staff of the importance for local community outreach, and engaging residents in conversations related to City projects which impact their neighborhood. Recognizing the basketball courts at Rainbow Recreation/DACA are heavily used by the community, and to facilitate wider neighborhood engagement, the Commission suggested the project organizers and staff provide at Comments Box for feedback and design selection.

The Commission requested their comments be shared with the teens at DACA.

8. PLANNING AND CONDITIONAL USE PERMITS:

A. REQUEST FOR THE PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION TO APPROVE DESIGN AND IMPLEMENTATION AND RECOMMEND APPROVAL OF A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT FOR BALLFIELD LIGHTING IMPROVEMENTS AT CURT FLOOD FIELD AND MAJOR ZONING VARIANCES FOR BALLFIELD LIGHTING IMPROVEMENTS AT GOLDEN GATE, LOWELL AND TASSAFARONGA FIELDS.

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission reviewed the staff report prepared by Christine Reed, Oakland Public Works – Project Delivery.

Staff requested approval of the design, implementation and endorsement of a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for ballfield lighting improvements at Curt Flood Field and major zoning variances for ballfield lighting improvements at Golden Gate, Lowell and Tassafaronga Fields. These four projects, funded by Measure KK Bond funds, include lighting upgrades and associated electrical wiring improvements for existing athletic ballfields. The improvements will upgrade the fields to meet safe play standards and improve energy efficiency.

Curt Flood's Open Space – Athletic Field use classification allows for Sports Lighting and the addition of new light poles which are permitted under the CUP. The installation of the new light poles would deliver coverage across the entire field.

Golden Gate, Lowell and Tassafaronga are zoned and classified as Open Space – Neighborhood Parks where both passive and active use needs are addressed. The Open Space classification also requires promotion of park uses compatible with local land uses and the City's natural environment. These parks are heavily used and have multiple athletic fields including some sports lighting (excluding Lowell). A Major Variance will be required to install new sports lighting which will improve accessibility of the fields.

Musco Lighting representative Ron Ziegler reported that the existing 30'-35' lighting poles installed in the effected ball fields are too short to efficiently light the areas of use. These poles have limited positioning ability and cause glare/light spillage in the surrounding neighborhoods. Musco recommended the installation of the standard 70' lighting poles equipped with LED lights which controlled remotely, are low maintenance and 40% energy savings and carry a warranty of 5 to 7 years. The height of the 70' LED pole would provide full area coverage, softer lighting and decreased light spillage into the community.

This lighting system would be housed in concrete underground thereby reducing the reoccurring issues of wire theft.

SUMMARY

Oakland Parks, Recreation & Youth Development received a request from Narcotics Anonymous (NA), an organization that aids recovering addicts in their quest to stay sober. NA is requesting permission to sell food, beverages, event merchandise and entry tickets at their Meeting and Dinner Dance at the Sailboat House on Monday, December 31, 2018. Proceeds will be earmarked for hosting future NA events and the organizational needs. Approval from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission is required per O.M.C. section 12.64.080.

FISCAL IMPACT

Narcotics Anonymous will pay an estimated \$1040.00 in rental fees associated with the event.

PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Narcotics Anonymous offers participants a traditional group oriented twelve-step recovery program to support their goal of achieving and maintaining sobriety. The group atmosphere provides help from peers and offers an ongoing support network for addicts who wish to pursue and maintain a drug-free lifestyle. This event is a meeting, dinner and dance in celebration of a clean and sober New Year. The organization hosts this event on December 31st to provide members a safe place to go on New Year's Eve where their sobriety is not placed in jeopardy. Event organizers estimate approximately 125 will be in attendance.

The following is a list of fees to be collected onsite:

- Tickets purchased at the door includes entry fee and dinner (\$50)
- Merchandise (\$300-\$400 in sales of merchandise)

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Narcotics Anonymous was founded in 1953; it is a global, community-based organization with a multi-lingual and multicultural membership. NA members hold nearly 67,000 meetings weekly in 139 countries.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the request from Narcotics Anonymous to sell food, beverages, event merchandise and entry tickets at their Meeting and Dinner Dance at the Sailboat House on Monday, December 31, 2018.

SUMMARY

For over 21 years, the Iron Souls Motorcycle Club has held their event at the Snow Building peacefully and without incident and wants to move the event closer to a less isolated venue. ISMC is requesting permission to host a live auction and sell wine, beer and raffle tickets at their 24th Annual Holiday Party to be held at the lakeside park Garden Center on Saturday, December 15, 2018, from 8:00PM TO 12:00AM. All funds raised, less expenses, will support the organization's community outreach efforts. Approval from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission is required per O.M.C. section 12.64.080.

FISCAL IMPACT

BACKGROUND

The ISMC was established in 1993, by 21 men who had a passion for riding Harleys. Their common interest was their love for motorcycles and giving back to the Oakland community. Over the years the club has expanded and currently there are two chapters. The Oakland Chapter consist of 29 members, and the Sacramento chapter has 12 members. More than half of our members are retired businessmen, professionals and civil servants including police officers, firefighters, postal workers, managers, union officials, school principals. Diversity is their strength and they live by their creed, "Brotherhood, Respect, and Unit."

RECOMMENDATION
